	The new TaDA Textile and Design Alliance residency programme was launched in September 2020. Every year, six to eight artists/designers from Switzerland and abroad have the chance to work for three months with various textile companies in Eastern Switzerland in a studio made available to them on site. Besides the artist residencies, TaDA has now also introduced a public discussion format called the Spinnerei. It provides a forum for presenting the results of the residencies and debating related issues of the day.
	This year's five residents are currently working with TaDA's partner companies and organisations. Stéphanie Baechler, Alexandra Hopf, Oliver Maklott, Selina Reiterer and Quang Vinh Nguyen come from diverse backgrounds. At the TaDA Spinnerei they will give insights into the projects and processes they developed during their residency. Afterwards, experts will discuss the topics of sustainability, sufficiency and luxury at three round tables.


Veronika Aumann Professor of Textile Design at the Stuttgart State Academy of Art and Design
